

Profoto HR Lantern Flat 1.7

This lovely light modifier from Profoto is sometimes referred to as a Chinese Lantern. Mounted on a boom, it can be used to simulate

Fujifilm News - Rebates are mostly gone...

If you have been in the market for a Fujifilm X system, let's hope that you took advantage of the amazing pricing in February and March! For April, the only rebates that remain are for the X-E1 bodies (\$599 - one only at \$539!) and X-E1 kits (\$799). There are also some rebates on a few P&S products but all the awesome lens rebates are gone unfortunately.

In other news, X-TI bodies, 56mm f/1.2 and 10-24mm f/4 OIS zooms have started rolling in although they are still in very short supply.

NEW! Fujifilm XF 10-24mm f/4R OIS Zoom (\$1,099)

We finally received a small shipment of the new 10-24mm zooms and I have also received my own personal one. By and large, I am very impressed with this new ultra-wide zoom which is equivalent to a 15-36mm zoom on a full-frame camera.

Following are a few key observations, presented in point form...

The GOOD

- A fixed f/4 zoom throughout its range. Making it faster would have resulted in a much bigger and heavier lens to maintain the same image quality.
- Very effective OIS, allowing for sharp exposures up to I full second handheld if you are a steady shooter!

- Exceptionally well controlled for flare. Shoot straight into the sun with minimal loss of contrast.
- Very sharp in the center of the frame at all focal lengths and f-stops.
- Very good corner sharpness in the mid focal lengths at most f-stops.
- Compared to the excellent 14mm f/2.8 prime, the zoom at 14mm is very nearly as good!
- Virtually no blue/purple fringing even on extremely bright specular highlights.



The BAD

- A fixed f/4 through its zoom range! Some people find this slow but with an EVF, you don't actually notice that it's "dark" in any way of course.
- Despite being a fixed-aperture zoom, like Fujifilm's other current zooms, there are no markings on the aperture ring.
- Suffers from some barrel distortion although many raw converters will already auto-correct. Considering how wide the lens is, the distortion is not particularly bad in my view.
- Suffers from a fairly "normal" amount of chromatic aberration for a lens such as this, an easy flaw to automatically fix with most raw converters though.
- Dust on the front element can cause visible flare spots when shooting into the sun. Keep the front element clean!
- At the longest (23-24mm) zoom settings, there can be some softness in the extreme corners even when stopped

down. The 23mm f/1.4 prime is substantially better here.

The UGLY

• Occasional "OIS induced" corner softness can be seen at most focal lengths even when stopped down, at least that is what it looks like to me. This is certainly not uncommon with ultra-wide stabilized zooms, which is why I personally would have preferred it not to have OIS. Turn the OIS off when not needed or use a tripod in low light for the best image quality! Even so, I still have some long term concerns on how perfectly well the lens will remain centered with OIS off. Whether or not this should really be included in "The Ugly" section is debatable but there isn't anything else really...

Phase One Demo/Rental SALE - P65+ and IO140!



In order to make room for a newer Phase One system in our rental dept., we have decided to put our current models up for sale. Up for grabs first is a **Phase One P65+** digital back. This is a 60 megapixel full-frame 645 digital back with extremely high image quality. It is mated to an autofocus Hasselblad H2 body and comes with an HC 80mm f/2.8 lens. All Hasselblad HC lenses have leaf shutters so you can sync your flashes at up to 1/800 of a second. The package includes batteries, charger, Firewire tether

cable and most standard accessories. In addition, a Hasselblad 120 film magazine for the H2 body is also included. The kit is cosmetically in good condition with only a few minor scuffs and scratches on the body. The H2 has 40,635 actuations and the 80mm lens has 12,334.

The Hasselblad H-body, viewfinder, film magazine and 80mm lens have a 30 day warranty, just like any other used item we sell, but the P65+ digital back will come with an extra few months, for a total warranty of 90 days.

The price for the P65+ package is \$17,995.

Next we have a **Phase One IQ140** with a **645 DF body** and **80mm leaf-shutter lens** offering flash-sync speeds up to a very fast 1/1600 second. The body has been upgraded with a 10K Li-lon battery pack and charger, giving you many thousands of frames between charges on the DF body. The IQ140 is a 40 megapixel 1.3x crop-factor digital back with an ISO range of 50-800, and in reduced resolution Sensor+mode, up to ISO 3200. The IQ140 is one of the newer generation of Phase One backs with a "Retina" resolution touch screen and a truly well designed and intuitive touch interface.



Our IQ140 digital back is a Value-Added bundle and there are still 2 years and 5 months remaining on the factory warranty as of mid-April. The 645DF body and 80mm lens will have a 30 day warranty.

The price for this package is \$22,495.

MindShift Rotation 180 Panorama - Initial Review

Yes, I know... this is not a "digital" article, but I just picked up a new MindShift Gear Rotation 180 Panorama bag and thought I'd give some feedback. The shipment arrived in time for my trip to the Southwest (yay) and I went on a day hike with it recently and will give you my initial thoughts...

The Rotation 180 Panorama (from here on, I'll just call the R180P) is the second bag by MindShift Gear, a spinoff company from ThinkTank Photo that is focusing on outdoor/hiking capable camera backpacks. The R180P is a very lightweight yet well-made camera backpack, coming in at around 3 pounds unladen, or just over 3.5 pounds with additional upper-compartment photo insert. The R180P's main claim-to-fame is an innovative waist-pack component that can easily be rotated out to the front of your body while you are wearing the backpack. There is a unique magnetic latch system and an adjustable tensioned flap that will easily click into place to hold the rotating waist-pack in the main body of the backpack. You really have to see this in action yourself to get a sense of how quick and easy it is!

The waist-pack is large enough to hold a full-size DSLR, like a D800 or a 5D Mark III with a 24-70mm f/2.8 attached. With a Canon 5D Mark III and the newer more compact 24-70mm f/2.8L II, or the 24-70mm f/4L IS, you could even fit the camera in vertically, lens down, and have room for a smaller flash or a small prime like an 85mm f/1.8. In my case, when I am using the R180P to carry my Fujifilm system, I have room for all of this in the waist-pack: Fujifilm X-E2 body with attached accessory grip and 10-24mm f/4 with lens facing down, the 14mm f/2.8, and 23mm f/1.4 stacked on each other on one side of the camera, and my 35mm f/1.4 and 60mm f/2.4 Macro stacked on the other side. There are some small, Velcro compartment divider flaps that allow you to have two layers of gear. I can swap out and mount any of those lenses and still stow the others. So, the size of the waist-pack is either suited to a fairly complete compact camera system like the Fuji or a Micro-4/3 kit, or to a minimal full-size DSLR kit. The lid of the waist-pack also has a compartment that's perfect for storing memory cards and as long as you don't pack it too tightly with lenses, there is a slot that will also fit an iPad Mini. If you really want to travel light, you can also remove the waist-pack component completely and use it as a fanny pack on its own.

In the top compartment I have added the photo insert and there resides my Fuji 50-230mm zoom (which can also stay attached to the body in the waist-pack) as well as my IR-converted Panasonic GF2 with 14-42mm zoom attached, plus a 20mm f/1.7 and Olympus 45mm f/1.8. There is still lots of extra room up top for a flash or two, or several of the flashlights I use for light painting, a timer remote, extra batteries, additional filters etc. In terms of DSLR lenses, you could fairly easily fit three larger lenses, including a 70-200mm f/4 or even, just barely, a 70-200 f/2.8 vertically, and still have room for a few accessories. If you just want to travel with a minimal kit in the waist-pack, you can remove the insert and have quite a large open compartment for a jacket, a lunch, a full-size iPad or other random items.

I find the shoulder straps and sternum strap very comfort-

able. The waist-belt is somewhat minimal, with padding only for the sides of your hips, but then the whole waist-belt needs to rotate in and out of the main backpack and if it was too thick, its movement would be hindered. There are a couple of ways of mounting a compact tripod and there is even a lighter weight setup for attaching a monopod. Lastly, there is an outside pocket that is specifically designed to hold a hydration bladder. There is a hole at the top to feed the drinking tube through, an inside attachment point at the top to attach the bladder to and keep it from drooping, a small drain-hole in the bottom, and the whole thing is completely on the outside of the main bag compartments and well away from any gear should the bladder spring a leak. MindShift specifies that the pocket should hold a 3 liter bladder but in practice I find even a full 2 liter bladder to be a tight squeeze. Note that the bag does not come with a hydration bladder - you are on your own to find one that fits. There are also a few additional lashing points on the outside of the bag for small gear pouches and there is a non-padded top compartment that is good for wallet, keys, GPS, a few energy bars etc.

Are there any downsides? Well there are only a few real ones that I have come across so far. The compact size cannot be considered an issue since if you have a larger DSLR setup, I would recommend the larger Rotation 180 Professional anyway. The first real issue with the R180P is that it will not stand upright on its base when set on the ground and not propped against something. Due to the curvature of the bottom, it will immediately fall over onto its front, the side opposite the shoulder straps. Secondly, while it is super easy and quick to get at the waist-pack when you are wearing the bag, it is far more awkward to get at your gear when you are not wearing it. I suppose if the bag had a flatter base and didn't flop over, it would also be easier to deal with extracting the waist-pack. Lastly, I'd love to see a few more lashing points for extra gear pouches or water bottles if the 2 liter bladder is not enough. Only the right side waist-belt has a nice wide strap where one could attach an additional heavier item like a lens or water bottle.

This really is a backpack designed for landscape photographers going on longer day-hikes, although it would be suitable for extended wanderings around a city too I'd say. With the hydration bladder and the ability to get at some of your gear without having to take the backpack off at all (great for muddy or sandy conditions or just for preventing theft while wandering around a city), this bag is going to be a very useful thing to have and I am planning on making it my main bag for my April trip.

Lensbabies!

If you have ever been interested in purchasing a Lensbaby, now is a great time to take another look at their products. They've released a newly refined



Composer Pro lens that will accept a wide range of optics which easily pop in and out. If you've never used a Lensbaby before, one of the interesting aspects about them is that when you purchase the Composer Pro lens it essentially acts as a housing for their various optical inserts that you can switch out. The optics range from a simple Fisheye, to a pinhole, a single glass or the more intricate Sweet 35 or Edge 80. All great optics to try with varying effects. For fun I decided to test a few of the optics with the Composer, focusing on the Edge 80, the Single Glass and the Sweet 35.

The Composer Pro series with the Sweet 35 or the Edge 80 optic have their own built in aperture ring, making it easy to adjust in various lighting conditions. Both are great optics, and each has a unique effect that will give a different look to your photos.

The **Sweet 35** produces a small 'sweet spot' of focus, surrounded by an edge of unfocused image allowing a very specific spot to be highlighted, or even to emphasize motion.

The **Edge 80** produces a 'slice' of focus, which allows items or subjects on the same plane to have a strip in focus from edge to edge. This effect tends to make the subject matter look like a miniature scene, allowing you to focus just on a subject like a line of cars on the horizon and blurring everything else around them. It also allows you to focus on a very specific part of an image for emphasis or a dramatic creative effect.

In the **Pro Effects Kit**, you get both of these lenses, with the Composer Pro as well as two macro converters, cleaning cloth and a nice carrying bag. We now have the Pro Effects Kit available in our RENTAL department for both Canon and Nikon mounts. See Jason's section for pricing and give him a call to find out availability! A great way to try out these lenses before buying is to rent them!

Also available in the RENTAL department is the original Composer and the Optics Kit, consisting of a Single Glass Optic, Plastic Glass Optic and a Pinhole/Zone plate Optic. None of these lens drop in optics have their own aperture ring, so you must use the drop in magnetic aperture rings that come with the kit. Lots of great fun to try out and just in time for International Pinhole day on April 27th!

Composer with Single Optic lens...

I wanted to try out a few of these lenses and optics to see what the real differences were, especially between the optics with the 'sweet spot' of focus vs the 'slice' of focus. So I took out the Composer and the Single Optic drop in, which is similar to the Sweet 35 in that it has the spot of focus with blurred edges but an approximate focal length of 50mm, and compared it to using the Composer Pro with the Edge 80. The Single Optic drop in lens also does not have its own built in aperture ring, so you must use the magnetic ones that come with the kit. For maximum dramatic blur effect and because I was in fairly low light, I stuck with a 2.8 aperture ring for the photos with the Single Optic. Even though the Edge 80 has a built in aperture ring, I also used the 2.8 setting for these photos to get the maximum dramatic effect. It was definitely nice to be able to quickly switch the aperture setting if I wanted to though. Because the sweet spot on both lenses is smallest when you are shooting wide open, it did make it a bit more difficult to capture that sharp spot, but when you do it gives a great effect.

I first tried the Single Optic lens on my own Canon 30D and then also on a Canon 5D MKIII. While the lenses

work well on both cameras, you definitely see a more distinguishable blur around your sharp subject with the full-framed 5D MKIII, only because it is not cropping the image like the 30D. Because of this it is also slightly more difficult



to grab the focus when using the 30D. Below you can see the difference between the tree, shot with the 30D and my dog Hudson's nose, shot with the 5D MKIII.The sharpness drop off and dramatic effect is greater with the 5D MKIII. You also see of course, a difference in quality and resolution because of the cameras themselves.

Composer Pro with Edge 80 lens...

Since I liked the uncropped look of the 5D MKIII, I tried out the Composer Pro with the Edge 80 just with that camera. Compared to the 'sweet spot' focus of the Single Optic lens, the Edge 80 gives you a strip of focus across the image that you can tilt to varying degrees in the Composer Pro.




I really liked this effect and thought it was interesting that you could take a shot of a row of trees that normally would be in focus from top to bottom and make it so only a strip of their middle section was now in focus.

As a comparison to show how the different lenses create a different look, here are some similar shots taken with both. First we have people walking down a path, taken with the Single Optic, showing a singular spot of focus in the middle of the frame.

Next we have my dog Hudson running down a path, taken with the Edge 80. You can see how there is a slice of focus that runs down the middle of the frame in this shot, where the gravel in the foreground and the trees in the background are also in focus along with the dog. Another shot shows how you can tilt the degree of the strip of focus. You can see the path Hudson is on is sharp as it goes around the curve.

As another comparison, the Edge 80 gives a miniature effect to scenes as shown in the following creek photo. This also

works well with far away people or cars, almost making them look like toys.



You can also see in these two photos of the creek to the right the major difference between the Single Optic and the Edge 80. The Single Optic with its spot focus gives a defined look with the outer blur and the Edge 80 is more subtle, focusing on a small spot of water and rocks along the water. Two very different views of the same creek!

So if you are looking to really have some fun with your images and play around with these various kinds of focusing systems, the Lensbabies are a great way to go! There are many other creative options with them as well, such as a drop in fisheye and creative aperture kits that let you play with the shape of the bokeh in your images.

Artist Steven Pippin has converted a series of washing machines into pinhole cameras. As well as a man in a suit, he photographed a series of a horse going through the laundromat, an homage to photographer Eadweard Muybridge.

Agfa Scala Options

Ever wanted to try shooting B&W slide film such as Fomapan R100 or Agfa Scala 200 to try to achieve a different sort of look, but can't afford the time it takes to send it to DR5 Chrome for processing? (DR5 Chrome is a professional lab in Colorado that specializes in black and white reversal processing. http://www.dr5.com/) I had an outdated roll of Agfa Scala 200 kicking around so after shooting it I sent it to Custom Color for them to develop in regular B&W chemistry, Kodak XTOL. It was processed and back to me in two days. I chose to scan it using the 'positive' setting on the scanner then invert in photoshop as I found the results were batter. The images have strong contrast and nice tonality in the shadows. However, it seems like they lack this latitude in the highlights, and I found that it was easy to over-expose the brightest whites in some cases. I have yet to try the Fomapan R100, so I am not sure if the results would be the same, but I think it is worth a try.





Impossible Project have released word on their generation 2.0 Color 600 film - limited quantities are available when ordered straight from their website. We won't have stock for a bit but hope to have some a little later in 2014. Watch our Facebook page, Twitter and blog to be the first to know when it arrives. The new 2.0 version color is said to give sharper, clearer photographs that process fully in two minutes. However they have reminded people of the 'experimental' qualities of the film by stating "it still needs refinement" and warning that the ISO might be a tad faster than the previous 600 film, so adjusting exposure using the darken/lighten wheel may be necessary.

We've found Impossible Project's limited Cyanograph film fun to use and photos appear sharp and clear. However, we've also found that in bright sunlight some underexposure is necessary. We have the SX70 version in stock, and the 600 version is available from the Impossible project website.

The pages are printed using the Indigo 6 color process and include a protective coating. I can see photographers dropping one shot per page for quick and easy design. Its very surprising to know you can now get 120 15"×11" photos bound into an album for around \$300.
