

First Impressions of the Canon EOS R5



The EOS R5 started shipping on July 30th at \$5,399. I only received detailed info on the camera a few days before writing this and feel as though I didn't spend enough time with it to cover all of its numerous features in accurate detail, many of which are class-leading.

I did recently have an opportunity to spend a day shooting with this new flagship 45 megapixel Canon mirrorless body, a final production version with final firmware. For me, this test was all about operation and ergonomics and I did not test out many of its headline features, such as 8K video, really high speed shooting, or focus tracking performance. Since I have very little personal experience with any of that, I wouldn't be the best person to evaluate how it behaves in that context. Hopefully my colleague Jason will talk about his experiences since he had a day to do some wildlife shooting with it. I did test out the eye-detect focus and found it to be amazingly "sticky" when latching onto an eye, even when the subject was fairly far away, and small in the frame. It pretty much worked as well as Canon has advertised!

I must say, the image quality was great too. Not only were

out-of-camera JPEGs nicely detailed, sharp and vibrant, but I was able to use a beta version of Adobe's DNG converter with the raw CR3 files, then run the converted raws through the latest version of Lightroom. The CR3 files are very malleable, allowing for a good amount of shadow recovery, with no sign of any banding or striping artifacts, far better overall dynamic range for example than what I remember getting out of a 5DS or 5DSr for example, the only other Canon bodies with a similar file size at 50 megapixels. I was not using any enhanced DR modes, nor Highlight Tone Priority, just simple raw files and very much liked what I saw.

I mainly shot with the excellent RF 35mm f/I.8 Macro lens, as well as an adapted EF I6-35mm f/4L IS. Both lenses proved sharp, especially the new 35mm, and image quality was fantastic overall. I did not have the camera long enough to do any extensive side-by-side tests with other Canon bodies, nor any of its competition like the Nikon Z7 or Sony A7R IV, but I felt that image quality was very competitive indeed with the best that's out there.

The body ergonomics were superb, with a very comfortable hand-grip, well placed dials and buttons and a few unique UI features I don't recall seeing on any other camera. That said, for various reasons I had never spent too much time with an EOS R or RP, so I can't be certain that



some of these weren't already on the older EOS R cameras.

One standout feature I feel, is the ability to turn on postcapture image review, but disable it when shooting with the EVF. With every other mirrorless camera I can recall shooting with, image review has been all or nothing. In other words, you take a shot and if image review is on, the frame will immediately appear in both the EVF and on the back LCD. You need to dismiss the review image before the camera is ready to shoot again. There is a setting on the new EOS R cameras that allows you to not display the image review in the EVF, but only on the LCD. Basically, if your eye is at the EVF and you are shooting, it is like image review is turned off. However, if you take your eye away from the EVF the most recent image will automatically display on the rear LCD. I set it for perpetual display, so pull your eye away and it's like you pressed the image playback button. The image is right there waiting for review. Cool! I found that surprisingly useful in practice!

There are three dials on the body that can all be customized, so getting your perfect combination of ISO, shutter speed and f-stop control should be easy. Also, RF



lenses have built-in customizable control-rings, and there is even a control-ring EF lens adapter that supplies a fourth dial when using older EOS lenses. One very welcome addition is that the focus joystick has made a comeback, after being absent from the EOS R and EOS RP bodies. I still feel that this is the absolute best way to select your focus point, trumping both 4-way controller and touch-screen options. It seems many others feel the same way since pretty much every other serious camera has a focus joystick of some sort. The only control that maybe comes close is Canon's new "swipe" AF button control on the IDX Mark III DSLR... that was a very effective way at moving the focus point too, albeit a touch too sensitive for my liking.

There are many options to customize the EVF display, the rear LCD, playback modes and more, so the EOS R5 is very flexible and can probably be configured to most people's taste. Overall it was a very pleasant day of shooting with very few complaints found. One surprising omission in my view though, was the fact that when shooting stills you cannot enable any sort of live highlight clipping alert. Personally, I find this invaluable when shooting high contrast scenes and while the EOS R5 has very flexible and customizable highlight "zebras" when shooting video, there is no option in stills mode to show what parts of the image will be clipped. I suppose this is something that can be added to the camera with a future firmware updated, were Canon to deem it something that a lot of people might want? One other minor complaint is the very large and obtrusive focus distance scale in the EVF. There are a few options to customize when this focusing scale appears, but it appears right inside the image and seems to persist longer than needed sometimes. I wish it could be shrunk down and displayed along the right of left edge of the image maybe, especially when you have the EVF in its smaller image mode, where otherwise there are no icons or numbers obscuring your composition. But really, that is about it. Other than those two minor points, for me the camera was very enjoyable and responsive to use.

Preorders are now over for the EOS R and sadly, the

number of people wanting this new flagship mirrorless was so large that Canon didn't have anywhere near enough cameras to ship all the preorders. As of this writing, we still have a waiting list and it could be another month before we can fulfill all our preorders. If you'd like more info, or have a specific question about the camera, I'd be more happy to try and answer them.

First impressions of the Canon EOS R6!



Much to my surprise, shortly after our EOS R5 demo day, my Canon rep dropped of an EOS R6 and that camera is not due to ship for another month or so. I only had a bit of time to work with it at home and don't have any photos worth sharing, but that test still allowed me to compare it to the R5, which I did shoot with a fair bit. As with the R5, I only just received some detailed info on the R6 and since I had only limited time with one, I have not been able to test its more advanced features. This will be about my first impressions as with the R5 section above...

The R6 is, in many ways, a slightly lower specced R5, with only a 20 MP sensor, apparently based on the excellent sensor in the IDX Mark III, and lacking the top LCD info display. In its place



there is a conventional "PASM" mode dial. There is also more plastic used in its construction and the weather



sealing is said to not be quite as good. Instead of a super high-speed CF Express slot, plus a UHS-II SD slot, both found in the EOS R5, the R6 makes do with dual UHS-II SD slots. Not much of a hardship with those smaller files I would say and it is nice that even on the less expensive model both slots are UHS-II, something not always found. In addition, the EOS R6 cannot record 8K video, rather it is limited to 4K and the EVF has less resolution.

There are likely other more subtle differences too (for example the remote socket is different) but apart from the above, I found the experience of shooting with the EOS R6 to be very similar to the R5, very enjoyable indeed in fact. The lower megapixel sensor means that it seems to have better dynamic range and seems to be even cleaner in low light than the already impressive R5. The EOS R6 will be a much less expensive camera and I feel long term, it will be a popular choice. Some people might lament the relatively low megapixel count, at least in this day and age, however 20 MP is plenty enough to make a 24x36 inch print that can stand up to close scrutiny. I used to make prints of that size from a 16 MP camera, and it is nearly impossible to tell those from ones I've made more recently with a 24 MP body. Obviously with only 20MP, you won't be able to do all that much cropping and if you are shooting a small or distant subject like a bird, then the greater MP count of the R5 would be an advantage. Despite its seemingly limited resolution, I would suggest seriously considering an EOS R6 unless you need to make huge prints, or need a slightly more rugged and higher specced body.

The R6 body will ship in late August at \$3,499 and we are taking pre-orders for it now.

FUJIFILM News

Fujifilm has just announced their latest wide angle prime for the medium-format GFX system, the **GF** 30mm f/3.5 R WR.

This lens is roughly equivalent to a 24mm lens on a 35mm body, so this nicely fills a gap in their prime lens



lineup, where there was a GF 23mm (18mm equivalent) and then a 45mm (35mm equivalent). This lens will be relatively compact and light and will sell for a very modest \$2,300. Note that I have not had the opportunity to even look at a preproduction sample, let alone shoot with one, so I cannot provide my usual initial feedback on this new lens. If past experiences are any indication, then I do expect this to be excellent optically of course, but final judgement will have to wait! The lens is available to order now!

NIKON Z5 Body & Kit Announcement!



Nikon has announced a slightly lower end full-frame mirrorless camera, the Z5. It offers many of the same advantages of the Z6, but in a body that is only \$1,899, or \$700 less than the Z6! It offers the same

FX sensor at 24 MP with 273 phase-detect AF points, the same rear LCD touchscreen, the same high quality 3.68 million dot EVF, the same degree of weather-sealing and even the same 5-axis IBIS. A change that will be welcomed by some, is the inclusion of dual SD card slots instead of a

single XQD/CF Express slot. The Z5 looks to be an amazing value for someone wanting to get into the excellent Nikon Z mirrorless system with access to all those wonderful Z lenses. I have not had a chance to handle a Z5 yet, so I am not able to comment on how it feels or operates, but I am very confident it will be an excellent camera!





Also announced alongside the new Z5 is a small, light kit lens for it that is purportedly quite a high quality optic. The Z 24-50mm f/4-6.3 is very compact and light and will sell for only \$529. The Z5 body when configured as a kit with the new Z 24-50mm is only \$2,299.

Lastly, a bit of Nikon Z news as a side note: the long awaited Z 70-200mm f/2.8 will finally start shipping at the end of August! That will make some patiently waiting customers very happy I'm sure!

NIKON Rebates

There will be rebates kicking in on August 7th (till Sept. 10th) for many Nikon lenses, including the 14-24mm, 24-70mm VR, 70-200mm f/2.7E FL VR, 80-400mm and even a rare one (rare as far as rebates go), the AF-S 105mm f/1.4E, so stay tuned to our blog for updates! I do not have details on pricing as of this writing...

SONY A7S Mark III and FE 12-24mm f/2.8 G Master Announcement

Sony recently announced their new flagship videooriented mirrorless body, the **long awaited A7S III, which will be priced at \$4,799** CDN and will be available as of September 24th. As seems to be the general "COVID-19"



norm these days, I have not had a chance to handle a preproduction camera yet, so I am unable to comment on its usability or image quality. Headline features include a newly designed I2.I MP sensor with I5 stops of dynamic range, twice the readout speed of the A7S II and surprisingly clean low-light images up to ISO 409,600. Sony has significantly redesigned the menu system for much more intuitive operation as well. A detailed preview will have to wait until some time in the future, when I hopefully have a chance to try one out!



Also announced is the widest angle **G**Master zoom an FE 12-24mm f/2.8. It
will start shipping on August 13th at
\$3,999. If other G Master lenses are any
indication, this should prove to be by far
the best ultra-wide angle zoom for the
Sony A7 series of cameras. Many of our
customers know of my appreciation for

excellent ultra-wide lenses, so obviously I am very much looking forward to testing one out ASAP!

This ring light, and any other ring light for that matter gives you a soft, nearly shadowless look that is very flattering and bathes the model/subject in light. The effect is most pronounced when the lens is in the center of the ring light. The ring light is dimmable and also can go from 3000K tungsten white balance to 5600K daylight white balance. As the ring light is LED, it never gets hot to the touch. Included in the padded case is a small ball head for a camera, and a wired remote to adjust power and white balance.

Panorama Point and Shoot Cameras

The point and shoot 35mm panorama wave started in the early 90's. Camera companies from Vivitar to the higher end camera brands such as Minolta, Yashica and Olympus all released at least one point and shoot, marketed solely for the panorama option.

We happen to have a couple of these here on consignment, the nicest is the **Minolta's P for \$165.00**. It has a 24mm f4.5 lens, it has the standard point & shoot features, DX reader that goes up to ISO400, built in flash and auto wind and rewind.

Personally I had only used the Pano feature on my APS camera, and I found it grainy in the least charming of ways, and the film was expensive to print as panos were printed on larger paper and cropped (keep in mind this was 2001). With all this in mind I was not expecting great results when we tried out the Minolta.

If your not afraid to lower the bar a bit on lens sharpness we also have a few of the 'Panoramic Wide Pic' point & shoots. They are selling for \$65 and a Vivitar T150 'focus free' (this statement cracks me up) for \$45.00





Finally we've had some sun, making it perfect for shooting those lower film speeds we all love so much! My favourite of those is **Film Ferrania P30**, a **35mm 80 ISO Panchro film**, it comes in rolls of 36 exposure. It is \$16.26 per roll.

Yashica Electro 35



The Yashica Electro 35 and its variants is a fixed lens rangefinder made in the 1960s and 1970s. It's an aperture priority camera with a 45mm 1.7 lens that is decently sharp and renders colours beautifully. The later versions even let you shoot up to 1000ASA and have a hotshoe for an external flash. Other than that, the only differences between all the models are the colour (chrome or black) and other little cosmetic changes.

As one of many fixed lens rangefinders released in the 60s and 70s, the Electro 35 is certainly one of the better ones. It's intuitive, pretty, and it produces sharp images. Sure, it's a bit large compared to its contemporaries, but this makes it a lot easier to use. The aperture rings and focusing knob, for example, are easy to reach and turn, while the viewfinder is big and bright without the frameline being too distracting.

One of the things people get turned off by when looking at Electros is the battery situation. The camera uses an obsolete mercury battery that is an environmental hazard. This is why the Electros we have for sale here at the store have all been adapted to use modern batteries!



Yes, we have a lot for sale right now, about a dozen or so! I decided to shoot one and see what it was like, and as you can see included here, some photos from the roll. It did turn out well, despite being expired Fuji NPC 160. The sharpness definitely impressed me.

If you're looking to try a rangefinder, definitely give the Electro 35 some consideration. The ones we have in store are going for anywhere between \$100-150 as they've been serviced and has had the battery adapter installed. Plus, they look kinda cool, don't they?


