



Lens Reviews

Fujinon XF 23mm f/1.4 R

One thing I've decided, is to try and feature a brief review of a different lens, camera body or other item every month. For items I currently own, or have owned recently, such as Fujifilm and Nikon gear, I will draw upon my existing experience and images for a



sample gallery and review. For other items, such as those from Canon, Sony, Sigma and so on, I will either borrow from our rental pool, or try and borrow from a company rep. and then head down to Granville Island for some testing, a location with lots of diverse subject matter that I've used many times over the years.

This month, let me start with a Fujinon XF 23mm f/1.4 R. This is one of Fujifilm's first fast primes, equivalent to a 35mm focal length in full-frame terms, and optically it is superb. It has a focus collar/clutch that you can pull back to engage manual focus, and you even have a traditional depth-of-field scale on the lens for reference. Being one of Fujifilm's older designs however, it does not incorporate weather resistance (WR) like the later XF 16mm f/1.4R WR did, and most of their newer lenses, however it has very solid and confidence inspiring build-quality. The XF 23mm f/1.4 is almost completely corrected optically with essentially zero barrel distortion and almost no chromatic aberration, so it basically does not require any software lens corrections.

The XF 23mm f/1.4 also gives nice out-of-focus highlights, with near circular rendering to f/2. The bokeh is quite pleasing, nice and smooth, with only a hint of green bokeh fringing behind the subject and a hint of magenta in front. This type of fringing is rather common with fast primes and, for example, even the brand new XF 50mm f/1.0 shows some of this. The 23mm f/1.4 is sharp in the center, even wide open, and once you stop it down to f/4 or so, you get fantastically sharp results from corner to corner. Image corners are decent, but not spectacular, wide open at f/1.4, but they improve to very good levels by the time you hit f/2.8 and peak at f/5.6. I have compared this lens directly to various 35mm f/1.4 full-frame lenses from other brands, and it beats most for overall sharpness, overall optical correction and corner image quality, especially when focused at infinity.

This lens is great for candid shots, street photography, or being able to isolate your subject from the background with wider f-stops at closer distances. For many, this focal length is ideal and ends up being one that is always in the camera bag. A 23mm prime is my own most used lens too these days, I'd say.



How does it compare to its little sister Fujinon, the XF 23mm f/2? Well, the 23mm f/2 is also a stunningly good lens to be honest, is weather sealed and much less expensive (only \$599). If you usually shoot stopped down for maximum depth of field, for landscape work as an example, there is essentially no reason to get the f/1.4. However if you do environmental portraits where you want a wider shot with some background blur, then the f/1.4 is definitely the one to get. It also has smoother bokeh than the

23mm f/2, and an extra stop wide open means better subject isolation as well. Lastly, autofocus in low light is improved since the camera has a whole stop more light to work with compared to the f/2. I own both the f/2 and the f/1.4, and for most daytime landscape work, to be honest I am now using the smaller, lighter f/2, but when the light levels drop, or I want a shallower DOF, then the f/1.4 gets put on my camera!

A new light! We recently received our first shipment of the Forza 200's from Nanlite. The Forza 200 is a monolight style LED, engineered to give maximum output with a minimal footprint. The Forza 200 will fall into the category of those who need a bit more power but don't want to make the jump to the Nanlite



Forza 300. We've had the Forza 300 for a while and are very happy with the construction and the quality of light, but when the Forza 200 was announced we felt this would be a great size and price for many photographers and videographers. With a light head weighing only 4 lbs, the Forza 200 employs a COB LED module and a precision-engineered reflector to emit 37540 Lux of 5600K daylight-balanced light at 1 meter, all while maintaining a high CRI/TLCI of 98/97, ensuring accurate color rendition. New Hahnemühle FineArt Baryta Satin Paper

This year a number of popular inkjet papers were discontinued due to a paper stock no longer being available. Unfortunately Hahnemühle's Photo Silk Baryta 310gsm, one of our printing station papers, and the most popular paper was among these. When we heard this was happening we ordered what we could of the Photo Silk Baryta to stock up but this will not last long. If you enjoy this paper, we do have a few packs left in 8.5x11, 11x17, 13x19, and 17x22 but this is your last chance to get it. Once it's gone, it's gone!

This being one of the papers we offer at our printing station, we needed a new paper to take Photo Silk Baryta's place. To find the replacement, we went through Hahnemühle's FineArt Glossy lineup and compared each paper side-by-side. Each of these papers is made from 100% cotton or pure alpha cellulose, acid and lignin-free, and ISO9706 compliant / museum quality for a high age resistance. After some discussion, we have chosen Hahnemühle FineArt Baryta Satin 300gsm as our new printing station paper. FineArt Baryta Satin has a slightly warm base

Zoom in this page to see more detail. The difference is visible when looking closely at the paper but is not very noticeable when at a proper viewing distance.

with minimal texture. Photo Silk Baryta's texture had a very uniform look to me, whereas the texture of FineArt Baryta Satin, while subtle, has more variety in it making it more noticeable to a keen eye. The satin-gloss coating is enough to offer rich blacks and good saturation but not quite so glossy as to hide the image when you catch a bright reflection. Contrast, saturation, and range of these papers is very similar; however, the Photo Silk Baryta seems to have just a bit more saturation and contrast to it. Keep in mind that these images are completely unchanged between papers so with just a very minimal amount of editing you should be able to achieve the same look.

Not that you often look at the back of your prints, but the FineArt Baryta Satin has smooth matte paper texture to it where as the Photo Silk Baryta has a plastic-like feel to it. FineArt Baryta Satin is a great all purpose inkjet paper and we are pleased to be bringing it in over the next few months as we transition away from Photo Silk Baryta. 



The Hasselblad 501C

I'd be lying if I tell you that I don't care for Hasselblads. Except I kinda want this particular 501C that just came in to the store for sale with



use. But now that I've fiddled with this one.....I have to say, I'm impressed. I'm more than impressed. Dare I say, it's better than the Mamiyas and Pentaxes in use. Short history lesson: The 501C is part of the Hasselblad V-System lineage, of which there are six distinct lines. The first and most well known of them is the 500



series, the last of which, the 503CW, was only discontinued in 2013. The main changes over the years were the expansion of the modular possibilities, with more interchangeable mirrors and winders, and even meters. The lenses were all made by Carl Zeiss, with improvements in coatings over the years. Carl Zeiss, as you probably know, is synonymous with optics that makes people go "wow!" or "damn!" or "ouch, that's sharp!".

So what makes the 501C so different from the 500C and 500C/M? There's the standard, much brighter matte screen. You can replace the older screens in the 500C/M (you can't on the 500C) with the matte screen, but the 501C comes with it already. Its incredible in its clarity. Then there is the shutter release button. It is so much more ergonomic, and there is no fiddling when it comes to attaching the back to the body, as the body immediately recognizes where the back is in regards to the exposure counter as it locks the shutter automatically when it reaches the end. It even has little rubber feet for it to sit on so it doesn't slide around on a flat surface. Of course, you can't change the winder like you could on the 500C/M or the 501C/M. It is a fully manual camera with no meter, and that's it. And of course,



it only comes in black. I always thought that the older, chrome only bodies were a bit to flashy and old fashioned, so this is more subtle. And the user experience! Everything feels and sounds like an old mechanical clock, its so damn satisfying!

But it comes with the Hasselblad tax. The price of the camera is \$2600. It comes with a prism as well as the waist level finder. It has an 80mm 2.8 Planar lens on it and the A12 back. If you can swing it, you should definitely buy it but if you can't, well come stare at it through glass and maybe we'll even let you touch it, provided you've sanitized your hands.
