Fujifilm Lens Testing Notes

With the intent to possibly buy an X-T5 for myself in the near future, I decided to do some quick lens tests. Since the X-T5 has the new 40 megapixel sensor, versus only 24 for my personal X-Pro2, I figure that some of my lenses might be challenged by the increase in resolution. Some of these comments are based on tests I did with the X-H2 (also the same 40MP sensor), especially since there are two lenses I no longer own.

I recently decided to sell my incredibly sharp, but seldom used, Fujinon XF 90mm f/2. It is a stunningly good lens even wide open, and I loved using it for tight headshot portraits, however for my more usual work shooting landscapes, cityscapes, architecture etc., it ended up rarely being used. Due to its incredible image quality and generally more useful focal length (for me), I decided to buy the new XF 56mm f/1.2 R WR and replace both my 90mm and my XF 50mm f/2R WR with it. I was sad to see both of the old f/2 lenses go, since both were truly excellent, but the new 56mm will nicely replace them both for the vast majority of my needs. So, on to the Fujinon lens testing notes at 40MP! Please note that I did not often test at wide apertures yet, simply due to time constraints...

Fujifilm XF 14mm f/2.8R: This is one of the earliest prime lenses that Fujifilm released, coming just after the original lens trio; 18mm f/2, 35mm f/1.4 and 60mm f/2.4 macro. I've had my 14mm since 2013! It is near perfectly corrected for barrel distortion and chromatic aberration, requiring no software correction. It performed admirably at 40 MP, only showing a bit of softness in the corners at wider apertures. By f/8, my usual shooting f-stop for that lens, it was basically tack sharp corner to corner.

Fujifilm XF 18mm f/1.4R LM WR: This is a new lens, which Fujifilm stated was designed for the new 40MP sensor, and it showed. Stunningly sharp, corner to corner when slightly stopped down and only a hint of weakness in the corners at the widest apertures. On my 24MP X-Pro2, the lens was basically flawless corner to corner at f/1.4, but on a 40MP sensor, the extreme corners were just a touch soft until getting to f/2.



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Fujifilm XF 23mm f/2R WR: This lens might have the weakest performance in my kit on the X-T5. At wider apertures, it shows some edge and corner softness, although once you stop down to f/5.6 the center is super sharp and the corners are not far behind at all. However, even center sharpness is a bit weak wide open. A better choice for the 40MP sensor would surely be either the older XF 23mm f/1.4R or the new XF 23mm f/1.4R LM WR. For me, I am happy to use the slightly wider 18mm for times when I want wide apertures, so I think I will keep the wonderfully light and compact XF 23mm f/2 for landscape or cityscape work, where I'd usually be at f/8 anyway. At that aperture it performs very well indeed at 40MP.

Fujifilm XF 35mm f/1.4R: My old 35mm surprised me. It was designed back in 2012 for the original 16MP X-Pro1 but on the latest 40MP camera, its performance is still very good indeed. It is very sharp wide open in the center, and is perfectly sharp everywhere in the frame at f/5.6. Having compared it more extensively to the new XF 33mm f/1.4R LM WR at 24MP previously, I do expect the corners to be soft at the widest apertures, so for night shots as an example, where you might want corner to corner sharpness at f/2 or less, it certainly won't be as good a choice as the new 33mm.

Fujifilm XF 50mm f/2R WR: I had tested this lens back on the 40MP X-H2 and it performed very well indeed, stunningly sharp corner to corner at f/5.6 and good even at wider f-stops.

Fujifilm XF 56mm f/1.2R WR: This is a new lens, also designed for the 40MP, and it certainly shows. It is stunningly sharp across the frame with corner performance very good even at f/1.2. At f/2, it is pretty much perfect across the frame. Compared to the older XF 56mm f/1.2, it has smoother bokeh, focuses closer and also focuses slightly faster. In fact, I would judge the new lens' bokeh to be even nicer overall than the APD version of the old 56mm, since the APD version exhibited varying amounts of softness for out of focus highlights that were towards the edges of the frame. The new 56mm, like the new 18mm, are must-have prime lenses for a new 40MP Fujifilm body in my opinion!

Fujifilm XF 90mm f/2R LM WR: This lens was also tested on the 40MP X-H2 and while crazy sharp in the center at f/2, surprisingly it is actually a bit weak in the corners even when stopped down. Corner sharpness at f/5.6 was a bit behind the center, and proved slightly less consistent corner to corner than the smaller, cheaper 50mm f/2. Once again, on my older 24MP body, it proved near flawless, but obviously 40MP proves to be more of a challenge when it comes to lens performance.

I have yet to try any zoom lenses on the X-T5, there are several more primes I'd like to try (like the new 23mm and 33mm lenses), and I also want to do some astrophotography with the prime lenses on the X-T5, but for now, that is the extent of my testing. Hopefully that helps you somewhat, if you are contemplating upgrading to an X-T5 (or to an X-H2), and were wondering how your lenses might perform at 40 megapixels. The weather forecast is for colder and clear nights, a great time for astrophotography, or you may be one of the lucky photographers planning a trip to the Yukon or to Churchill to photograph the Aurora Borealis, and are looking at ways to protect your cameras from the cold and the elements. 
if compared to an unprotected camera.



A Look At Leica Thread Mount Lens Rangefinders

LTM cameras are one of the most underrated cameras on the used market today. The Leica Thread Mount (commonly known as M39) is a screw mount made by Oskar Barnack - known as "the Father of 35mm Photography."

After the Leica I was released, Leica cameras surged in popularity, causing many companies to make bodies and lenses using the LTM mount. After Leica released the Leica M3 in 1954, companies like Canon and Nikon would continue to manufacture cameras and lenses viewed to be comparable to the M-mount Leicas.

We've gotten a few LTM bodies along with some lenses in store!



Leica IIIF + 50mm F2 Summitar: \$1100 for kit

One of the most popular "Barnack" Leicas, this camera is significantly smaller than most M mount bodies. The IIIF also has one of the brightest viewfinders in any pre M-mount Leica.



Is It Worth Bulk Loading Film?

Bulk film is sold as a 100' long roll. How many rolls you can get from that is up to you. If you were to make your own 36-exposure rolls, then you should be able to get around 20 if you are careful not to expose too much film every time you load it. Some people prefer to make rolls with fewer exposures, like 16 or 20. In that case you'd be "wasting" more film since some film will definitely get exposed when loading it, but it gives you flexibility and you can still get a decent number of rolls. Bulk loading film is actually pretty easy to do. The challenging part is loading the 100' roll of film into the bulk loader in complete darkness.

Tools you would need for bulk loading film:

- Bulk loader
- Film cassettes
- Any sort of strong tape
- Scissors
- Any 100ft roll of film

Something about loading film by myself just gives me that joy. It's the same joy I receive when loading film in a film camera for the first time.

There are definitely pros and cons to bulk loading film.

Pros:

- It's cheaper than buying 10 or more rolls of 24-36 exposure of film on its own
- If you love shooting and developing B/W film, you will have a good supply
- You can load in anywhere at anytime when needed.
- ECN options If you love motion picture film (alternative to Cinestill)
- More environmentally friendly with less packaging

Cons:

- Not enough 100Ft film options
- No C41 options
- No DX code on the film, so you cannot use on a point and shoot.
- Expensive ONLY if you barely shoot film

Since the beginning of this year my goal was to shoot more B/W film, so bulk loading film is a good option for me. I was planning on spending money to buy close to 20-30 rolls of black and white film when I realised that using bulk film, I would save some money down the road. So if you love B/W film and want to save money, try bulk loading your film. :)

PS - It's always good to label your film cassettes so you know which film you are using.

My go-to bulk film at the moment would be llford FP4, which sells for \$161.59 for a 100' roll. https://www.beauphoto.com/product/ilford-fp4-plus/
